In conclusion, our favorite part is the "Heroes Walk." All of our students and staff line the hall as *The Star-Spangled Banner* echoes triumphantly throughout the school. The veterans and active service members walk the halls as our students sing and wave flags in honor of our brave men

Golden Rule Week
